It is very fun and fulfilling to make new friends and to focus on a common goal, Our Library. And, with ongoing updates and new content always being added, you'll keep coming back to discover more. Popular and recently added collections include:

U.S. collections deliver hundreds of millions of names from sources such as federal and U.S. censuses; birth, death, and marriage records including the Social Security Death Index; and U.S. border crossing and trans-ocean ship records.

Canadian collections provide nearly 60 million records from the Census of Canada, and key vital records, such as the Drouin Collection (1621-1967), which includes nearly 30 million baptisms, marriage, and burial records from Quebec.

U.K. collections offer censuses for England, Wales, Isle of Man, Channel Islands, and Scotland, with nearly 200 million records: Births and Baptisms (1834-1906), Marriage Licenses (1521-1869), Deaths and Burials (1834-1934), and Poor Law Records (1840-1938) in London, and more.

Other international collections continue to grow with more than 46 million records from German censuses, vital records, emigration indexes, ship lists, phone directories, and more; Chinese surnames in the large and growing Jiapu Collection of Chinese lineage books; Jewish family history records from Eastern Europe and Russia; and more.

Military collections deliver over 150 million records containing information often not found elsewhere and includes records from the colonial to the Vietnam era.

Multimedia collections deliver millions of files ranging from family and gravestone photos to postcards and newsreels.

All this, plus an intuitive search interface, detailed search indexes, and helpful Learning Center tools, makes Ancestry Library Edition an indispensable resource for any library serving genealogists and historians. Try Ancestry Library Edition in your library.

Children's Programs

Imagine yourself sitting under a magnificent huge old black oak, known as the "Mother Tree," with stunning clear blue skies overhead and an occasional fluffy cloud floating by, and enjoying a mild cool breeze as children's stories are being read aloud. This was the experience at our outdoor, fresh-air story times at the Idyllwild Nature Center's amphitheater during spring and summer 2021, as well as last fall 2020.

All of the story times held at the Idyllwild Nature Center were based on various nature themes and were followed by nature walks conducted by trained docents who reinforced each story's theme during the walk. Some story time themes included: "Hiking Day," "Mountain Wildflowers," "Squirrels," "Pine Trees and Pine Cones of the San Jacinto Mountains," "I Love Bugs," and "All About Owls." Theme-related take-home craft kits were prepared for the children, and library books were available to check out. Thank you to Helen Hixon for a fun story time about bugs. Also, a big thank you to Dianne Franco for an informative presentation about owls and for her efforts in transporting a burrowing owl, named Gabby, and Luna the barn owl to story time from the Coachella Valley Wild Bird Center. We want to thank the Riverside County Regional Park and Open-Space District and Steve Perez, Idyllwild Nature Center Park Ranger, for making outdoor story time possible. We are grateful to the Friends of the San Jacinto Mountain County Parks for their participation in story time, especially Denise Ohrazda and Mary Rider, for conducting the nature walks, and Pamela Mayfield for photographing many of the events.

An additional story time this summer was held at the newly remodeled Idyllwild Town Hall for the children attending day camp. Following each story time, the children made a themed-related STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics) project, such as making thaumatropes, learning about the ocean zones, conducting a compass experiment, and performing

an experiment about how solar and lunar eclipses occur.



Of course, summer would not be complete without the summer reading program. This year's summer reading theme was "Reading Colors Your World." Summer reading was an eight-week program, June 14, 2021 to August 6, 2021. Each week's theme was a different color. There were on-line programs and events for pre-readers, children, teens, and adults. In addition to reading prizes awarded by the Riverside County Library System, the Idyllwild Library gave prizes to top readers in each age category, weekly gift boxes, a participation prize, and a Five-Book Challenge prize to those who read five books. The five-book challenge participants were awarded a \$5 Gift Certificate to one of the following local businesses: Alpaca Coffee and Tea, Amelia's Donuts, Atomic Cow Creamery, or El Buen Cacao. The Friends of the Idyllwild Library made it possible for Idyllwild Library to reward our summer readers with these wonderful prizes.

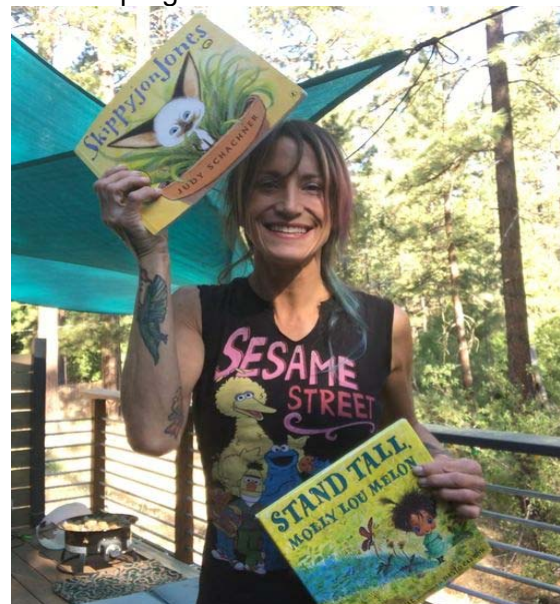
Friday ZOOM Story Times with Rachel Torrey was another fun and lively summer event. In addition to reading stories, singing, and lots of moving about, Ms. Rachel taught many ASL signs (American Sign Language); children learned the ASL signs for the colors of the rainbow. Ms. Rachel will be continuing Friday ZOOM story times at 10:30 a.m.

During the fall and winter months there were numerous STEAM and virtual children's programs recorded by Yumi and Susan. Some of our STEAM projects were "Hopping, Popping Corn," "Ice

Fishing," "Strong Paper," "Fizzy Rainbow Easter Eggs," and "Straw Challenge – Building with Straws."

We were pleased to take part in a virtual LENA Start (Language Environmental Analysis) program earlier this year. LENA Start is a program designed for families with children from birth to three-years with the goal of helping parents learn how to increase talk and encourage reading with their babies in those early years. Interactive talk has been proven to be a key factor in healthy early brain development. During LENA Start, families use LENA's "talk device" to measure their child's language environment. Over the course of ten-weekly sessions, families are given feedback reports, and learn techniques and strategies on how to increase the quality and quantity of talk at home. Organizations all over the world use LENA programs to enrich the language environments of children. LENA's aim is to build early literacy skills, stronger families, and school readiness.

During this past year story time could not be held at the library due to the pandemic restrictions. However, all of these programs continued with Zoom and with lots of help, and we truly appreciate collaborating with these many agencies and organizations in order to bring story time and other programs to our local children. Check with the library for upcoming fall story times and afterschool STEAM programs.

A hearty "Welcome Back" seems to be in order! After declaring 2020 to be a "non-year" (to say the least 😊), we're glad to be resuming our usual activities and grateful for the financial support of our community. Without you, we would be unable to help fund the Idyllwild Library. As it is though, we continue to invest heavily in the library's reading programs, community events, book collection, and children's activities. Did you know that every year the Friends of the Library provides:

- **\$6,000** to purchase new books to be added to our catalog
- **\$8,000** to provide for cultural enrichment (speakers, authors, performances) and reading programs for kids and adults.
- **\$3,000** to cover the costs of advertisement, administration, and supplies like earbuds, flash drives, and a 3D printer.
- We also steward a building fund to cover additions and improvements to the library itself.

Not bad for a small mountain community! So, where do we get the money to do all this?

From YOU... your Friends Memberships, your purchases at the Friends Bookstore, your silent auction bids, your support at our bi-annual book sales, and your generous donations. Lessons Learned in a Pandemic

Libraries kept Americans connected in ways that brought our communities closer. Buildings may not have been open, but libraries were never closed. **Julius C. Jefferson, Jr., ALA President**

I'm sure you have seen many lists and heard hundreds of stories on how the closures during the COVID-19 pandemic affected everything we do. Much of it has not been pleasant or easy but I found that there is a bright side to even the most difficult of situations. Here is a list of library lessons learned by our staff during the pandemic closure from March 17, 2020 through February 8, 2021 when we opened fully-staffed with normal hours.

The library isn't ever really closed.

Riverside County Library System has always offered virtual library cards, eBooks, videos, databases and more to our patrons. Many people didn't realize how much was available but as the closure continued, we were able to encourage them to use those services online through the RCLS website at rivlib.net. Our patrons visited the page and found reading resources and so much more. RCLS expanded those resources to include new versions that were easily available from home. Check out the [eResources](#) page and try not being surprised at all that is available with your library card.

Digital services can be amazing.

Some of the available digital services are much more than we are able offer physically in the library. Using your library card you are able to search for your family history through Ancestry.com Library Edition or watch classic ballet, opera or concerts using Medici. Looking for a free movie? Have you tried out Kanopy yet? You are able to ask questions of library staff every day from 9am to 6pm five days a week. They can answer every question you ask inside the library and still provide the personalized service to hold books or answer a complicated research question through the LiveChat and Ask a Librarian services. Need a book right this minute? Search for eBooks and audiobooks on CloudLibrary.

Virtual programming can be fun, too.

Our staff, Yumi and Susan, learned some new skills during the closure. There were story time videos and craft videos for children to see at home when it was convenient for them. These amazing ladies created fun, collaborative programs with the Idyllwild Nature Center and the Idyllwild Community Garden to have story times and crafts outside. Our book clubs and Miss Rachel's Storytimes for the Summer Reading Program went on Zoom. Though we missed being in the same space, these activities were the next best thing to being there. We even had author talks with three favorite local authors.

Personally, I like working from home sometimes.

I was actually surprised at how much of my daily responsibilities were already being done online. With help from the IT Department, I was able to continue to communicate with colleagues and work friends, keep up with committee work on the eResources, Homelessness Resource and Summer Reading committees from my newly created home office. We managed the entire 2020 "Dig Deeper: Read, Investigate & Discover" Summer Reading Program on BookPoints, an online summer reading management system. The team created videos, used social media to encourage participation and gave amazing incentives for our top readers. I was able to interact with people in real time by taking shifts on the new Live Chat service offered through the RCLS website.

I've learned the value of Zoom and several other online platforms for face-to-face conversations. Some of those conversations were Statewide meetings on how to continue to provide for our patrons during the closure. As much as I appreciate seeing everyone in person, I was amazed at how much I was able to do from home.

Spring cleaning is better when you have an entire year to do it.

One of the best surprises for us was the ability to clear up the backlog of to-do's we often don't have time for. Colleen did a very thorough cleanup of the collection removing books that aren't read and making more space and, ultimately, more new books available when we reopened. The entire staff cleared workspaces and emptied storage cabinets of material we hadn't used in years. The purpose of this hectic cleaning was to be sure we could provide a safe and sanitized library when we all returned.

It's been a tough time but we are glad that we could still be there. We are especially grateful to be working in a library where we were able to continue being of service during the closure when many things weren't available. Maybe we had to do things a bit differently, but our Idyllwild Library was and will be there for you.
