


Upcoming Events Sponsored by Friends of the Idyllwild Library

Children's Programs

As the temperatures slowly rise and the days grow longer during this time of year, we at the Idyllwild Library are busy planning our summer reading program. This year's summer reading theme is *Read, Renew, Repeat.* Our summer reading program will feature the idea of conservation, which will make for a wonderfully diversified summer reading program. We're excited to share with you some of our planned summer children's programs:

- Summer reading kick-off is scheduled for Wednesday, June 12, with guest musician Craig Newton performing his America's Multicultural Music program.
- Miss Rachel will be visiting the library for a summer reading/musical program with The Space Goats.

- We are also pleased to have Riverside County Department of Waste Resources presenting a recycling program for children on July 3, as well as an adult program about backyard composting on July 17.
- Bob Greenamyer with Idyllwild Community Garden will be teaching children about community gardens on Wednesday, July 17.
- The summer reading awards party is scheduled for Wednesday, July 24. Joe Gandelman and Friends, Ventriloquist, will be featured for this fun-filled event. Please refer to the summer reading calendar for a more extensive list of events happening at our library.
- Our collaboration with the Idyllwild Nature Center continues to be beneficial to both of our agencies. On July 10, Riverside County Park Ranger Sonny Waldron will be visiting story time in order to discuss the lemon lily restoration efforts taking place at the nature center. In addition, I will be conducting an outdoor story time at the Nature Center during the Lemon Lily Restoration Festival on July 13, as well as a Lemon Lily Nature Story Walk.

Look for these upcoming outdoor story times and the nature story walks at the Idyllwild Nature Center during these special events:

- Wildflower Show, May 25;
- Butterfly Days, August 17;

- Bark in the Park, September 20;
- Trail of the Acorn, October 12.

Now let's take a look at some of our ongoing children's programs:
After school **STEAM** (Science,
Technology, Engineering, Arts,
Mathematics) program has been a lot of fun.

Last month, we observed *Pi Day*, March 14, by graphing the first thirty digits of pi, which created a beautiful city scape, and the children received individual pies for a special treat.



In February, the children enjoyed making slime for **Be My Valen-Slime** themed program.







In April, for **National Robotics Week**, children will make their own doodling coloring robot.



The first Wednesday of each month, thanks to volunteer **Pat McComas**, we are able to offer a **bilingual story time**. In April, we enjoyed celebrating **Día de los Libros y Día de los Ninos (Day of the Book and Day of the Children),** in March, **Read Across America,** and in February, **Chinese New Year/Dragons. Cinco de Mayo** is our bilingual story time for May.

Volunteer **Luanne Galizio** has led many entertaining story times, which included unicorns, St. Patrick's Day, and Earth Day. Guest **Diane Millene** will be presenting a special fairy tale story time featuring "The **Princess and the Pea.**"

On May 29, the **Grossman Burn Center** from West Valley, California, will present an interactive story time teaching children and parents how to stay safe from getting burned.

After a long winter, we resumed the *Tales* to *Tails* early literacy reading program with Animal Samaritans of Thousand Palms, California. Claire Spence and her therapy dog, Rakeara, AKC, CGC, are a great team. They work with children individually in order to encourage them to increase their reading skills and confidence in reading as they read to a certified therapy dog.



The **Best Book Club of Idyllwild**, Idyllwild Library's youth book club, reached its one-year anniversary in March, and it is still going strong. We usually have an average of twelve to thirteen *tweens* attend. We meet the third Wednesday of each month at 4:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. **Tate Donovan** and I lead a discussion about the month's selected book for the first half-hour. We then conclude with a theme-related craft and snack. We read a variety of genres.

In March, children read and discussed the non-fiction book *How to Turn \$100 into \$1,000,000 – Earn, Invest, Save*.

Everyone made dream boards illustrating the importance of why we need money and how to save money. In April, we read a action-adventure fiction entitled *Masterminds* by Gordon Korman, and in May, our book selection was *My Side of the Mountain.* Each participant looks forward to receiving his/her own copy of the book. During the summer, we will be taking a break. We will resume the youth book club in the fall.


